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President's Column

Greetings to all you Club Members. I'd like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, with the prospects for a good Winter in the hills looking favourable as we prepare to step into a new century.

Our Club is now in its 38th year and is still looking good in many aspects. However, the lack of the younger members, and families, has to be of concern as it is only through the influx of these that the Club can continue to prosper and maintain its original aims.

Many things have changed since those early days and legislation, rules and regulations governing the right to roam, in my opinion, have detracted in many ways from the basic ideas of enjoying our day on the hill. The enormous amount of people going to the hills to-day has obviously brought this about, but I feel that Clubs like our own can still provide a healthy introduction to hillwalking and mountaineering and promote spirit the true of companionship which. to me. appears to be sadly lacking to-day.

This might seem like a scratchy old record being played again, but this feeling is obviously being transmitted to the general public as well, and this may be part of the reason for the decrease in younger members and families joining Clubs where an incorrect image is, often mistakenly, being portrayed. Not for the first time have I heard comments made about our Club being for hardier souls, capable of doing long hard days in the hills. This problem is not ours alone, but only we can rectify it and it is obvious by the numbers joining Clubs, some right on our own patch. that there are families out there who still want to be associated with Clubs who can provide days on the hill to match their capabilities.

This I feel should be a challenge for the Club going into the new year and new century - bring back the families and the young ones and hear their ideas for maintaining the Club, but also help them to understand the true companionship to be gained through a mutual love and respect for our mountains and mountaineering.

Throughout the year, again the meets have been a success and, again, largely due to the few - I'm sure we all know who they are. To all of you who put so much into the Club, year after year, I say grateful thanks on behalf of all the Members. The progress you have made in arranging next year's meet to foreign parts should provide an exciting first for the Club and on this you should be congratulated. On the home front. there are a lot of good meets still to come and I hope to join you on some of them. I can only apologise for not getting on the hill more often this past year but, unfortunately, the old body has taken quite a bashing recently and so another hill has to be climbed and another challenge met. Fortunately, I am still busy and the mind and imagination is still active, I think, and I still have ambitions, hillwise.

I will now finish by thanking everyone in the Club who has supported me over the last 3½ years and for this I will be forever grateful.

I will be standing down at the next A.G.M. to make way for someone who is more capable of leading the Club forward in the coming years and I will become again an ordinary Member, maybe occasionally, in the next century, asking the question TAR I WI NOO?'.

IN AID OF MENINGITIS - 7 mad Munroists climb 7 Munros - THE GLEN SHIEL RIDGE

The seven of us set off on Friday evening in 2 cars with 2 cycles and reached Rattigan Youth Hostel about 10:30 pm. 6a.m. Saturday the alarm clock rang. After a quick breakfast we set off at 7 a.m. to position one car at each end of the ridge with the 2 cycles half way in case anyone had to abort the walk.

At 8a.m. we set off from the Cluanie Inn, in high spirits, for this 14K trek. It was an easy walk up a tarred road, then we struck up the hillside to Munro number one, Creag a Mhainn (947). There we met another party of hillwalkers, being led by an experienced guide, sitting enjoying the sunshine. The ridge was quickly gained as there were no technical difficulties, just clambering up and down rocks with narrow, dramatic sections which had a steep drop to one side. We soon climbed Drum Shionnach (987) and Aonach air Chrith (1021). By this time we knew the other party and had our photograph taken on the top of every Munro by one of their party. Soon we reached Maol Chinn-dearg (981) and it was lunch time ! over half way and only lp.m. The views of Glen Quoich were magnificent.

No one was tempted to take the easy way off at number four and with a little climbing over a grassy plain we reached number five Sgurr and Doire Leathain (1010). Another photograph and a short break and we headed for Sgurr an Lochain (1004). Unfortunately some mist rolled in but we had time for another photograph! 7 Munroists in purple T-Shirts posing once again. Perhaps Hello magazine would like our style and fashion.

Now for the tricky part. We bypassed the top Sgurr-Beag and clambered up the rocky path to Creagnan Damh (918). The Munros were completed by 5p.m. We continued to follow the dyke further on and then branched down to a fairly steep gully and made for the river Shiel. This was crossed and we had a rather long walk out to the car. It certainly saved us from a long 7 mile walk back to the hotel. The time was 7p.m. which totalled 11 hours altogether.

Back to the Rattigan Youth Hostel for a quick shower and a bar supper in the Glen Shiel Hotel.

The Glen Shiel Ridge is fabulous and we had a perfect day for walking it. We collected sponsorship money from our fellow walkers and many, many thanks to all the Forfar hill walkers who so kindly sponsored us too. In all we raised over £550. Well done the "MAD MUNROISTS"

<u>July 99 - Linn o' Dee</u> (12) No bus. Left from Linn o' Quoich and climbed Beinn a'Bhuird. Cloudy on top so didn't cross to Ben Avon.

<u>August 99 - Loch Ossian</u> (19) Caught train at Rannoch Station to Corrour. Three walks - Beinn na Lap, Sgor Gaibbre/ Cairn Dearg and Leum Uilleim. Great weather but the midges were the worst ever experienced, especially while waiting on the train.

<u>September 99 - Glen Coe</u> (14) Poor weather in the west while roasting in the east. One group climbed Buachaille Etive Beag in cloud and rain. The other group circled the hill via the Lairigs.

September 99 - Lake District (10) Great accommodation above Glenridding. Strong winds all weekend. Walked north along Dodds ridge on Saturday. One group on Place Fell and one group on Gowbarrow Fell on Sunday.

October 99 - Glen Prosen (11) A round of the head of Glen Prosen striking up left from Kilbo over Broom Hill to reach Mayar from the west and on to Dreish and down the Shank. Strong winds and heavy showers, but good visibility at times.

October 99 - Skve weekend (19) Fantastic weather for Skye and October. Sgurr nan Gillean on Saturday for Frank's last Munro. A small group on Pinnacle ridge. One on Glamaig. Others at the Quirang. On Sunday groups on Bla Bheinn, Sgurr a' Mhadaidh, Sgurr a' Ghreadaigh, Ciste Dubh, Old Man of Storr, Beinn Sgulaird.

<u>November 99 - Mount Keen</u> (12) No bus. Was to have been Ochils, then changed for Bill McDonald's last Munro but then changed but poor weather meant a cancellation. Instead Mount Keen climbed with traces of snow. Cloudy on top.

<u>November 99 - Sqor na h-Ulaidh (15)</u> An unofficial meet. Bill McDonald's last Munro (appropriately in Glen Coe). Lovely cold clear day with great views. Only disappointment was news of Scotland's defeat at Hampden.

December 99 - Glen Oqil (9) Bus cancelled for 2nd month in a row due to poor numbers. Group struck up the west ridge of Glen Ogil in fine snowy conditions as far as Toardy Hill until heavy snow started.
