Web site changes

The current web site (our 3rd revision) brought frame based pages and our own domain name. It is mainly text based – fast download. Work has now started on the 4th revision. One of the problems about the current host is space for images, especially high quality images like the photographic competition. There are many free image sites around the web. So, all images are being ported to free web space on an experimental basis. The one chosen is Picasa (even though it is part of the Google "big brother" empire). There is 1GB of free space available which is 100 times bigger than the space for the whole web site itself. Pictures are not stored in ultra high resolution but they appear to be good enough. Since the webmaster never receives any photographs, it is hoped to allow members to upload photographs themselves. There is a link to the new image location from the web site. However it can be reached directly on http://picasaweb.google.com/fdhwcalbums. The revision 4 web site will be non-framed based. include blog (really a bulletin-board for weekend walking partners, with appropriate log-in for data protection purposes). For the geeks, the web site is hosted by a server running the Microsoft Windows 2003 Server operating system. ASP.NET is available but not currently used, but will be used in the 4th revision in order to store data in a database on the server. Cost remains at £19 hosting per year (for 100MB) plus £5 for domain name (www.fdhwc.org.uk) rental.

Emergency 999 or 112

Most members will probably have heard that we had an emergency evacuation on the May meet to the Black Mount. Roy Hebenton fell ill on that meet. Ian Hadden, a new member with medical experience and Linda dealt with the casualty as

Ray and Colin went separate ways for help. The O2 emergency number (112) didn't work but luckily Colin met a lady with a Vodaphone mobile which also showed Emergency Only. He dialled 112 and the Scottish Air Ambulance Service helicopter was there an hour later. Roy was treated on the hill and then flown to the Southern General in Glasgow. Roy is recovering well, and hopes to be back with us when he has fully recovered. By that time, Ray, Colin, Linda and lan had no chance of completing the walk and retreated to Inveroran Hotel, joining Steve who had walked off earlier, where they were interviewed by the Police. The hotel provided soup, tea and biscuits. The club has sent a donation to the Mountain Rescue team for that area. Two other groups that helped that day have been thanked by a note on the web site. The last incident of this kind was in March 2000 in Glen Etive, late on a snowy winter's day when Nick Parsons broke his leg. Colin and Ray were both involved that day too, so if you want to avoid rescues, keep away from them!

Treasurer's Report

On this occasion I prepared accounts for the 11 months up to 31 December 2007, as agreed at the previous AGM. The 'short year' was to allow more time to prepare the paperwork and have it checked before presenting the accounts at this year's AGM.

I can confirm that Ray Campbell, he's the accountant and your former Treasurer, checked the sums before the books were handed over to our internal auditors. On this occasion it was Stuart Fergusson who aided John Norrie in the verification of the books and the final accounts. I'm pleased to report the records were found to be in order. It sounds so simple, but as ever there is occasional doubt in my mind as to whether the figure should go in the credit or debit column. It is a relief when the checks confirm the figures balance!

Overall, the credit rating of the Club remains A*. We ended 2007 with an accumulated fund of £1,803. This is an increase of £243 on the figure declared in the last accounts.

Our membership numbers dropped slightly in 2007. At the end of the year we had 65 members and this generated income of £1,200 (down from £1,330 in the previous year). The hire of buses returned a loss of £156 and the weekend meets also returned a small loss of £24. The main annual expense remains the fees payable on your behalf to the Mountaineering Council of Scotland. These totalled £602 for the year.

Obviously we are now looking at the rising cost of fuel and the impact this will have on bus hire costs. There is no great cause for concern at present but the situation will have to be monitored. The bus fares will remain at £12 per passenger for the time being.

At the AGM it was also agreed to retain the membership fees at £20 for a full member and £10 for an associate member.

For those members interested, a copy of the balance sheet and the income and expenditure account is available on request.

Meet Secretary's Report

27 December 2007 Glenshee

Sixteen members turned up for the traditional Christmas meet on a fine, if windy, winter's day. Not for the first time, we headed to Glenshee but on this occasion we made for the hills on the west side of the road. A further variation on normal practice saw us tackling the Cairnwell from the south, thus avoiding the unsightly ski lifts even if this meant a longer climb. We completed the round of all the tops, namely Cairnwell, Carn Nan Sac, Carn a' Gheoidh and Carn Bhinnein. We rounded off the day with a festive drink in the Spittal of Glenshee Hotel. Estimated distance walked was around 14 kilometres.

January 2008 Auchnafree Hill

Due to dreadful weather this walk over a popular Corbett was cancelled.

13 January 2008 High Tea Meet Ballater

Twenty-one walkers waited patiently on the bus at Luthermuir for a sleepy secretary who obviously did not get an alarm clock for her Christmas. After she joined us the bus took us to Bridgefoot where the walkers ventured onto the open hillside in light snow and climbed Morven, descending via Peter's Hill to the Pass of Ballater. It was another day of low cloud and poor visibility, making members wonder if 2008 could possibly be as bad weatherwise as 2007. The walk covered a distance of 13 kilometres. Thirty members then enjoyed a very good high tea at the Sauchieburn Hotel.

10 February 2008 Ben Vorlich

Eleven members went by car and met on the south Loch Earn Road, squeezing into a small parking area next to the loch. After some height was gained, members once again found themselves in the familiar surroundings of a grey curtain of hill fog. Most members continued to Stuc a'Chroin with the poor visibility making it difficult to find the appropriate starting point for the final assault on the summit. The walk was notable for the complete lack of snow on Ben Vorlich in February, although Stuc a' Chroin had a reasonable covering. Distance covered on this walk was 14 kilometres.

9 March 2008 Drumochter

The walkers split into 2 groups, with ten opting for the hills on the east side and four on the west side. The east-siders covered 16 kilometres and took in the Munros of A' Bhuidheanach Bheag and Carn na Caim in steadily improving weather conditions. The group on the other side of the road were not so lucky and cut their walk short, climbing A Mharconnich and Geal Carn before turning back in the poor conditions. The day was completed with a refreshment stop at Dunkeld.

21-23 March 2008 Mamores Weekend

We were booked into the Blackwater Hostel in Kinlochleven, which was being run by a young lad of about sixteen while his parents were holidaying in Australia. Most of the twelve members present enjoyed a day of classic winter conditions in the Mamores on Saturday, with a few others going further afield to bag Corbetts. A downpour on the Saturday night did not bode well for Sunday, but thankfully it had cleared up by the morning. Could our luck with the weather be turning? Five members climbed Stob Dhubh, a very steep-sided Corbett in Glen Etive, while another group climbed Ben Challum on the way home.

20 April 2008 Linn of Dee

With the longer daylight hours now being with us, more adventurous walks were planned for this meet, with a choice of a 28 kilometre walk over Beinn Bhreac and Beinn a Chaorainn or a cycle and walk totalling 35 kilometres to Cairn Toul. Eight members plus a guest opted for the former and six chose the latter. The weather was favourable for once, with excellent views of the snow-covered Cairngorms all around us. The underfoot conditions were also very kind, at least for the nine walkers, who experienced a carpet of snow on top of frozen ground on what can often

be a very boggy walk. The cyclists left their bikes at Derry Lodge and found the going very hard with deep snow by the time they reached the col between Devil's Point and Cairn Toul. Four members turned back after reaching Cairn Toul but two intrepid members managed the round of Cairn Toul, Angel's Peak and Devil's Point. The day ended with a visit to the Spittal of Glenshee Hotel.

2-5 May 2008 Durness Weekend

After being badly let down by our first choice of accommodation, we eventually secured lodgings at the Youth Hostel. Saturday saw a unanimous vote for a traverse of Foinaven. On Sunday and Monday different groups headed in various directions, with some opting for the northerly Munros and others Corbett-bagging.

18 May 2008 Black Mount

This was the first bus meet since January and a rather disappointing fourteen members and guests turned up for what is a classic through walk from Inveroran to Glencoe over four Munros. The walkers set off from Victoria Bridge and by the time the steep ascent to the summit of Stob a' Choire Odhair was completed, the party was well split up. One walker then took seriously ill on the bealach between Stob a' Choire Odhair and Stob Ghabhar. It was our good fortune to have a guest with us for the first time who has a medical qualification. The patient was airlifted from the hill and taken to Southern General Hospital, Glasgow. He was discharged later the same night and thankfully is making a good recovery. After giving statements to the police, a very subdued busload of walkers made a belated return to Forfar. The Club is very grateful for the assistance given by our guest, Ian Hadden, who took charge of the situation on the hill in a very professional manner.

8 June 2008 Ben Cruachan

Another rather disappointing turnout of fifteen for a bus meet to a very popular mountain. All members of the party reached the main summit with a few making a detour to take in the Taynuilt Peak. The meet was notable for the appearance of John Easson to notch up another Munro and edge ever closer.....only four to go on Skye and then his secret last Munro, which I believe is on an island, but not Skye. John decided to go back down after reaching the top and was accompanied by Ray, while the rest made their way round the ridge to Stob Diamh. Two members went on to climb Beinn a' Bhuiridh before rejoining the others on the path down from

the dam. Once again we were blessed with clear, sunny weather.

20-22 June 2008 Kintail Weekend

Seventeen members and guests stayed at the National Trust Outdoor Centre at Morvich with a further two staying at the camp site across the road – the best turnout for some time. Saturday was an ideal day of sunshine with a cooling breeze. Most members did the entire South Glen Shiel Ridge, with others climbing Carn Ghulasaid and its two neighbours, Sgurr Gaorsaic, A' Ghlas Beinn and Beinn Fhada. Sunday provided a stark contrast with low cloud, high winds and driving rain. A coastal walk for some or an early return home were the order of the day for most.

Mystery Meet

The mystery meet this year will be on Sunday 6 July and will be organized by Mel and Bill Dryburgh. Please give your names to them beforehand if you intend to go.

Social Walks

Your Committee has responded to requests from a number of members to introduce additional Club walks. These could probably be best described as more local, slightly shorter or less strenuous 'social walks' – with a bit more time to 'blether'.

The plan is to trial this idea with the following two walks:

Sunday 31 August 2008 - The Airlie Ridge

Starting at Dykehead, the plan is to walk the length of the ridge, picking up the Minister's Path before finishing at the Glen Clova Hotel. This will obviously involve planning to leave a car at the hotel to ferry drivers back to the start. (c11 miles/17km, ascent 500m)

Sunday 26 October 2008 - Glen Isla

Starting at the head of Glen Isla, the plan is to follow the tracks and footpaths to Little Glas Maol before completing a loop back to the start. (c10 miles/16km, ascent 650m)

For both walks meet at the Myre car park, Forfar at 8.30am.
